Monday	Humpty Dumpty (trad)	Today, we would like you to learn the poem off by heart. Practice it with actions to help you remember the words (and also because actions help to make it more fun). If possible, can you please upload you reciting the poem to Seesaw?	To learn to appreciate rhyme and poems. To be able to recite a poem by heart. To speak audibly and fluently.	There are stories that the poem Humpty Dumpty was about a Siege Engine that fell over at the Siege of Gloucester in 1643. What can you find out about Siege Engines?
Tuesday	Ten Things a Real Princess Can Do (by Clare Bevan)	Read the poem. You'll notice that this one doesn't rhyme. Poems don't need to rhyme but they are written differently. This one is written as a list. Either: Write some more things to add to the list OR: Write your own poem: 10 Things a real teacher can do	To learn to appreciate rhyme and poems. To plan writing out loud. To use capital letters & full stops. To be able to write a list.	Can you work out which princesses and which fairy tales are talked about in the poem?

Thursday	The Battle of Hastings (by Marriott Edgar)	Listen to Mr Wilkinson read the poem and then answer the questions about it that are in the workbook.	To learn to appreciate rhyme and poems. To discuss events in the text. To make inferences. To discuss what is being read.	The Story of the Battle of Hastings is told in the <b>Bayeaux Tapestry</b> . What can you find out about the Bayeaux Tapestry?
